# **Project News**

# TAGGING IN MICRONESIA AND PHILIPPINES

The second phase of the Pacific Tuna Tagging Programme (PTTP) extends the successful Phase 1 (PNG and Solomon Islands) into most areas of the equatorial western Pacific Ocean (Lat  $10^{\circ}$  N  $10^{\circ}$  S, Long  $130^{\circ}$  E –  $180^{\circ}$ ). In 2008, Phase 2 activities include a one month Central Pacific cruise (CP-08-01 completed last June along the Line Islands) and a five month cruise (WP1) that will cover the EEZ of FSM, Palau, Philippines, Indonesia and part of PNG waters.

The main tagging platform, FV Soltai 105, commenced tagging operations in June, with Dr. Antony Lewis as cruise leader (and Tagging Programme Coordinator),

Two "cruise legs" have been completed in FSM, the first one was completed on 17 July and covering mainly the Pohnpei area and south of it, down to about 04 N. The second leg covered the western part of the EEZ, ending in Palau on the 14<sup>th</sup> August, tagging through the states of Chuuk and Yap.

Tagging in Palau commenced in early August . Fishing was spent to the east and west sides of the Palau's main islands, seamounts to the south and west of Angaur island, south of the EEZ comprising Helen Reef/Tobi Island and the Sonsoral small island group.

Tagging in the Philippines commenced on September 1, and fishing was spent in the Sullu Sea, towards the Basilan Strait, Zamboanaga and the Moro Gulf.

On 25 September the tagging vessel left Philippines for Indonesia waters.

## **Tag Releases**

Total tag releases at 27<sup>th</sup> September stands at **20**, **933** for WP-1. This brings the total number of tag releases for the project to **125**, **948**. The current tagging operations will cease on 23<sup>rd</sup> November, and a further two tagging cruises are planned for next year.

#### **Tag Recoveries**

Recaptures from the recent releases are starting to be reported. Total tag recoveries as at 27<sup>th</sup> September, stands at 497 for **WP1**. This brings the total number of tag recoveries for the whole project to 13517, with a 10.73% recovery rate. Figure 4 shows the displacement of tagged tunas from the area which they were tagged.

The number of tag recoveries by month (**Figure5**) shows large fluctuations in the rate of recovery with the larger amounts of tags being returned a month or so after the commencement of tagging operations.






Figure2. Pie charts representing the proportion of tunas tagged in an area by species, during WP1,as at 27<sup>th</sup> September

(c) Bigeye, n=1240







Figure 4(a) Displacement (>100nm) of tagged tuna from PTTP releases (a) skipjack (b) yellowfin (c) bigeye




Figure5. Tag releases-returns by month

#### **Dr. Ashley Williams**

We take this opportunity to introduce Dr. Ashley Williams, SPC's recently recruited Albacore Biologist.

Ashley joined the Ecosystem Monitoring and Analysis team as a Fisheries Scientist in May 2008 and is responsible for analyzing biological and ecological data leading to enhanced understanding of the population dynamics of South Pacific albacore tuna. Prior to this appointment he was a Senior Research Fellow at the Fishing and Fisheries Research Centre at James Cook University, Townsville, where he led several research projects focused on providing fisheries managers and stakeholders with pertinent information for the assessment and management of fisheries within the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage Area and Torres Strait.

Ashley will implement a tagging project for albacore beginning early next year and as such we would like you to be aware of the upcoming project. As well as building a albacore fishery specific network of contacts and tag recovery officers we intend to extend the tag reporting and tag recovery system used in the PTTP, for the albacore tagging project as well.
